

Higher Education Emergency Relief Fund Report – Emergency Financial Aid Grants to Students

Jupiter Beauty Academy (OPE ID:042292) received education stabilization funds under Section 18004(a)(1) of the Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security Act (“CARES Act”), Public Law No: 116-136. This Fund Report applies to the student portion received under the Higher Education Emergency Relief Fund that is designated exclusively for emergency financial aid grants to students.

The institution appreciates that Congress and the President have made these critical funds available for eligible students who have expenses related to the disruption of campus operations due to the coronavirus pandemic. We take receipt of these federal funds seriously and are distributing them in accordance with the CARES Act and implementing guidance.

1. The institution signed and returned to the Department the Certification and Agreement [for] Emergency Financial Aid Grants to Students. The institution has used, or intends to use, no less than 50 percent of the funds received under Section 18004(a)(1) of the CARES Act to provide emergency financial aid grants to students.
2. The total amount of funds that the institution will receive or has received from the Department pursuant to the institution’s Certification and Agreement [for] Emergency Financial Aid Grants to Students is **\$22,110**.
3. The total amount of emergency financial aid grants distributed to students under Section 18004(a)(1) of the CARES Act as of the date of this Fund Report is **\$22,110**.
4. The estimated total number of students at the institution eligible to participate in programs under Section 484 in Title IV of the Higher Education Act of 1965, and thus eligible to receive emergency financial aid grants under Section 18004(a)(1) of the CARES Act, as of the date of this Fund Report is **42**.
5. The total number of students who have received an emergency financial aid grant under Section 18004(a)(1) of the CARES Act as of the date of this Fund Report is **42**.

Distributing Emergency Financial Aid Grants under HEERF

Our Institution is currently providing three programs, two of which have more than 600 hours and are Title IV programs. Based on the Department of Education guidelines, only students who are or could be eligible to participate in Title IV programs may receive emergency financial aid grants. A number of our students who have filed a Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) and have a certain Expected Family Contribution (EFC) have demonstrated eligibility to participate in Title IV programs. At our school, we decided to distribute the fund equally to all students who have filed for FAFSA and are receiving Federal Pell Grants to attend our programs.

Attachment B

All students who are eligible to receive emergency financial aid grants are required to fill out a form expressing the needs of each student. After our institution receive the form and confirm the information, our institution will issue checks to students. The funds awarded may only be used for eligible expenses related to the disruption of campus operations due to COVID-19, including eligible expenses under a student's cost of attendance such as food, housing, course materials, technology, health care, and child care.
